From the President

On a sad note, Albert J. "Bud" Murphy Jr. (Tau '38) passed into the Chapter Eternal this summer. Bud was a member of the Delta Tau Delta Distinguished Service Chapter, a former Arch chapter member and a member of the Tau Chapter Hall of Fame. Bud was a great supporter of Tau chapter and his loss will be felt. Our heartfelt sympathies go out to his wife, Betty, and his two children and their families. Below is a portion of the obituary that ran in the Pittsburgh newspapers.

Albert J. "Bud" Murphy J.R. '38—Chapter Eternal

Beloved husband, father, and grandfather, died suddenly on Thursday, July 12, 2001. He was 86 years of age. AJ, known as "Bud" to his friends, was born in Sewickley, PA on October 21, 1914. As a young man he was an accomplished football player for Sewickley High School and an avid baseball player for the Sewickley YMCA club team. As a young accomplished baseball player and avid lifelong fan, he played against some of the great Minor League and Negro League players of his generation. Bud attended Penn State University during the height of the Great Depression. It was there that Bud found the two great interests of his professional life. The first was his fraternity, Delta Tau Delta, which he would

remain an active brother, promoter, and advisor for the rest of his life. The second interest was a love of learning — specifically focusing on leadership training and business administration. After graduating in 1938, he worked for Delta Tau Delta as a field agent building houses and advising fraternity members. This early experience built a benchmark of professional administrative roles and he would become Dean of Men at Carnegie Technical School (now Carnegie Mellon University) in 1940. While serving in the position he met and fell in love with Betty Stapels, who in May, 1941, would become Betty Murphy, his wife of 60 years.

At the outbreak of the Second World War, Bud volunteered for duty with the United States

Marine Corps, but because of a medical disability was not accepted. Wanting to do his part, he accepted a position as an administrator on a top secret project based out of New York City. This "Manhattan Project" would take Bud to Oakridge, TN, and lead to the development of the atomic bomb and the end of the war in the Pacific. After the war, Bud, Betty, and their two children settled in Pittsburgh, where Bud had a job with the Westinghouse Electric Company. In his 35 years with the company he traveled across the country and globe building leadership seminars for executive education.

For his efforts and because of a distinguished career he was awarded the

Westinghouse Order of Merit upon his retirement in 1976. Bud and Betty then built a farmhouse overlooking Lake Arthur in Butler County. In this idyllic setting Bud remained active with his Fraternity, Butler Rotary, and at Mt. Chestnut Presbyterian Church, where he served as an Elder. He worked his farm until the day he died. He is best remembered as a strong, intelligent gentleman who was always the life of any party. He was a family patriarch. AJ Murphy Jr. is survived by his wife, Betty Murphy; his children, Albert J Murphy III and his wife, Laurel, of Butler, and Judith Murphy Isherwood and her husband, Jack, of Sewickley, and four grandchildren.

Tau History

With the organization of Tau chapter in February 1872, Delta Tau Delta became the first fraternity on the Penn State campus. Since the founding of Tau chapter, more than 1,200 men have crossed its threshold and have accepted the responsibilities of membership.

Unfortunately for the first Tau inductees, from 1870 through the late 1880s secret societies were out of favor with the Penn State administration, and Tau chapter closed after only one year. There had only been 12 men initiated at that time and the university president gave the men of Delta Tau Delta a choice between the fraternity or their academic careers.

Tau chapter returned to Penn State in 1912, but the true beginning stretches back to 1909 with the formation of Alpha Kappa Delta, a local fraternity at the Penn State campus. This fraternity was initiated on November 22, 1912, with 20 alumni and 34 undergraduates. The first house was located near the old post office in State College, according to Walter Munroe (Tau '30). Mr. Munroe pledged Delta Tau Delta as a freshman and indicated that about 24 to 28 men lived in the Shelter at that time. According to Samuel Williams (Tau '31), freshmen were required to sleep on the third floor, which had only a ladder for access. In the case of a fire, there was a "hay rope" that ran from the attic to the street outside the house. (cont.)

Gift Left to Tau Chapter

Tau chapter owes a great deal of gratitude to John R. Lewis, Tau class of 1922. Last fall, Tau corporation president Fred Taylor was notified that Mr. Lewis had left a sum of \$40,000 in his will to be donated to Tau chapter upon his passing into Chapter Eternal.

Mr. Lewis was born on August 31, 1900, and matriculated to Penn State in 1918, from York, Pa. He majored in chemical agriculture and lived in Newtown Square and Lancaster as an adult. Penn State awarded him the Pioneer Medallion in 1992. Mr. Lewis passed away in September 1995. The proceeds from Mr. Lewis's bequest

will be utilized to improve the infrastructure of the Shelter.

A number of brothers have demonstrated interest in donating funds to the chapter on a posthumous basis. Of course, donations at any time are greatly appreciated. Tau History, Cont.

The chapter continued to grow in numbers and reputation, and in 1928 the chapter relocated the Shelter to Garner Street. In order to meet the rent, the chapter was very aggressive with rush, and soon the brotherhood was up to 40 members. Mr. Munroe was the treasurer of Tau, and Mr. Williams followed Mr. Munroe as treasurer and ultimately became president of the chapter his senior year. Mr. Williams recalls that Hugh Shields traveled to Tau as a chapter field consultant. Mr. Williams described Mr. Shields as "a good man who was on the ball." As a freshman, Mr. Williams ran on the Penn State cross-country team that captured the ICAA team championship in 1927. Mr. Williams finished 25th out of 125 runners at the meet. The team picture hangs in Recreation Hall, and you may want to check it out the next time you find yourself on campus.

Both men went into business after graduating during the Depression. Mr. Munroe lived and worked in the Akron, Ohio, area most of his adult life. He worked in accounting, finance and auditing with a number of companies including Koppers Coal, Firestone Tires, Akron Children's Hospital and a couple of governmental agencies. Mr. Munroe retired in 1975 but then went back to work for another 12 years as a manager of Cole National Key Shop in a Sears shopping mall. "And it was the best job I ever had!" he said. Mr. Munroe retired for good in 1987 at the age of 80. He and his wife, Alma, were married for 58 years, and had a daughter and son. Alma passed away in 1997. Mr. Munroe resides in Stow, Ohio, and his hobbies include model railroading, watching Penn State football games and watching the Cleveland Indians and Browns on television, and surfing the Internet.

Mr. Munroe maintained a friendship and spoke periodically with Robert Wick (Tau '26), who lived in Pittsburgh. Mr. Wick was the owner of Wick's Furniture, a well-known furniture store in Pittsburgh. Mr. Wick passed to the Chapter Eternal earlier this year.

Mr. Williams graduated with a degree in dairy science and became a dairyman in Middletown, Pa. He started with a small herd that grew steadily over the years. Mr. Williams ran the business at Bryncoed Farm until he retired about 30 years ago, when he turned the business over to his sons. Mr. Williams and his wife of 68 years, Carolyn, have four children.

On May 8, 1976, 40 Penn State men living on the first floor of Snyder Hall pledged their allegiance to each other and became a local fraternity. They named themselves Alpha Lambda Tau to mimic the dorm house of Allentown House. Initially, the fraternal bond was formed so that the brothers could avoid an impending dorm lottery, but it soon became a bigger cause. A year later, these men and their pledges were accepted as a colony of the Delta Tau Delta national fraternity. By the spring of 1978, they were initiated as members of Delta Tau Delta, reactivating the Delt chapter that had left campus in 1968. The brothers moved into a house at 429 East Hamilton Avenue the following fall.

On July 27-29 of this year, 25 brothers and 50 family members and friends returned to State College for the 25th anniversary of the founding of Alpha Lambda Tau. Though the years between meetings presented some evidence of maturity (a few gray hairs and wrinkles), the

bond of friendship and pledge of brotherhood were renewed and some old traditions were revisited. The event was held at the Nittany Lion Inn and included a formal luncheon program and a cookout and party at the Delt house on Saturday night. The evening was topped off with an appearance by Little Nemo (aka John Peel and Tom Moore — both halves now are part of our Southern Division) that was enjoyed by children of all ages. The night concluded with the singing of the Delt "Sweetheart Song" at the insistence of John Russell (Tau '77).

The event was organized by Jim King (Tau '78) with assistance from Tim Phillips (Tau '79), Bill Fustos (Tau '79) and the Delt undergraduate chapter. "Putting this event together was a labor of love," said Jim. "We have so many fantastic memories of Penn State, State College, the fraternity and the time we all spent together that many of us felt a need to revisit our roots, and we have pledged to stay in touch with each other in the coming years."
