The spring semester is unfolding as a major stepping stone for Tau. With the 13 new initiates from the fall pledge class, we now have 45 active brothers, the strongest our chapter has been in over half a decade. Tau has grown at an unprecedented rate over the last two years, despite a sharp decline in overall Greek recruitment at Penn State. In fact, we pledged nearly double the all-fraternity average. Our rapidly growing numbers combined with the ongoing capital campaign have infused Tau with new energy and enthusiasm to become the most prominent chapter at Penn State.

Spring rush went very well, and we now have a pledge class of seven. With only six seniors graduating at the end of this semester, and several returning from internships, our chapter will grow even more in the fall. There will be many new faces in Tau, as all 13 newly initiated brothers from the 2003 fall class are planning to live in the Shelter next semester.

Community service is also at an all-time high. In the beginning of the fall semester, all of the brothers pledged to complete five hours of community service by Christmas break. Every brother completed his pledge, and several completed many hours beyond their pledge. We orchestrated a home run derby with Alpha Phi Sorority and raised \$600 for the Kevin Dare Foundation. And we surpassed last year's house total for 'Thon, raising more than \$31,000 toward Penn State's total \$3.5 million in contributions toward the Four Diamonds Fund.

We have started an academic competition within the house involving a buddy system for brothers with similar majors and a cash prize. We also completed a house office on the first floor and are now holding regular study hours. Increasing our current house GPA is a major focus for this semester.

Our intramural basketball team is currently undefeated, and we have high hopes for the upcoming championship. We also placed third in a close swim meet in the fall. Tau is currently ranked 12th out of 60 teams in the interfraternity sports overall, but basketball, racquetball and soccer are sports in which the house traditionally excels.

The Tau Housing Corporation agreed at the last meeting to split the cost of a big screen TV. It came a few days before the Super Bowl, giving us a chance to watch the game together, with several rushees, in the Chapter Room for the first time in years. With our growing numbers, the upcoming summer renovations and a brand new TV, it is needless to say that morale is through the roof. We are planning skydiving and rafting trips later in the spring to push the brotherhood even further.

Every aspect of Tau is coming together, lending our chapter the positive momentum to reach its full potential. Tau is stronger than ever, and we are using that strength to push our chapter ever closer to greatness.

As alumni continue to return to the house, their stories remind us of how little things really change and grant us a new vision of Tau from one looking back at his time here. The brotherhood they maintained through the years displays how strong the connection becomes among brothers. We invite you to come to the Shelter and see the progress we have made and are still making. We are proud of the steps we have taken and wish you to join in the pride with us.
